ANNOUNCEMENTS President Kelly had several flyers available for anyone interested in an opportunity for service and a modest stipend for "Renewable Energy Hosts/Tour Guides" for bus tours coming in to White County from Randy Mitchell at the Office of Economic Development.

Grace was given by Frank Walker and members and guests enjoyed an old-fashioned canal style meal of beef stew, slaw, corn bread, rhubarb crunch and bread pudding.

PROGRAM

In 1832, canal construction began in Ft. Wayne. Upon completion in 1853, the Wabash and Erie Canal spanned 468 miles from Toledo, Ohio, on Lake Erie, to Evansville, IN on the Ohio River. It provided a waterway that connected the East Coast with the Mississippi River, New Orleans and the Gulf of Mexico. It was the longest canal in the U.S. and the second longest canal in the world. Founded in 1974, the Carroll County Wabash & Erie Canal Inc., is dedicated to preserving this three mile stretch of historic made-made waterway. The canal boat, which we got to ride, was 54 feet long and 10 feet wide. It was recreated in Albany NY in 2008 and rides 8 feet above the water. Some original canal boats were 85-90 feet long and 15 feet wide and pulled by mules along the water's edge traveling at 4-5 miles per hour.

Reed Case was born in Kentucky in 1808 and moved to Indiana with his family in 1810. In 1838, Mr. Case, a skilled brick mason, secured a contract to build the Wabash & Erie Canal from Logansport to the junction of the Tippecanoe and Wabash Rivers. Reed Case built his house in 1843-44 on Front Street in Delphi. The original Federal-style frame home consisted of four rooms, two down and two up and a center hall with a door at each end and a grand staircase to the side. He died in 1871. The home was donated to the Canal Center in 1986 and restoration began one room at a time. The tour of this home was given by Mark Smith, Carroll County Historical Museum Curator.

The Interpretive Center, the only museum designed to tell the story of the Wabash and & Erie Canal, concentrates on the 44 year operational history of the Canal. The lobby showcases a series of beautiful oil paintings which highlight historic sites along the Canal from Toledo, Ohio to Evansville, IN. Interactive exhibits provided opportunities to experience what travelers faced in the 1800's.
